 - a. Anna Cardin developed and analyzed testing data for each school. This data was shared with the committee. She also shared how each teacher had access to all data that is being used to analyze the strengths and weaknesses of our students and our program. This data analysis was looked at monthly through progress monitoring meetings with teachers and also principals.
 - b. Angie Snuggs shared both 611 and 619 IDEA Budgets:

- 2. **Compliance violations**-There were no compliance violations.
- 3. **Highlights and Accomplishments-**More parent engagement, parents are becoming more eager to plan and organize various events. Able to push for more resources in order to grow the special education program. Growth of SWD's is happening across pretty much all of the parish. This growth is slow but study for last few years. 2 books were written and published about two of our students. Authors attended SEAC event to share. Suspensions and Expulsions were way down. Number of students who needed behavior intervention plans was also way down. Graduation rate improved by 19.92 percentage points.
- 4. Areas of Improvement-LEA Determination showed a decline in APR 13. I have spoken to Gisele Bryant as well as Meredith Jordan in regards to this. We have looked over everything we can possibly think of and cannot find the discrepancy. Still waiting on state to help us out with this. We cannot make sure we are making this right if we cannot figure out what we are doing wrong. Cohort Credential Attainment was down. We are working with CTE supervisor to figure out ways to get more of our students credentials. Still working towards more inclusion, co-teaching, and strong interventions for our students.
- 5. Parental engagement is pushed across the whole parish. Each school is responsible for many activities that encourage parental involvement. They use a variety of tools to get the word out from group me, school marquees, j-calls, newspapers, Facebook pages, district website etc. etc.
